1.0 Preliminary

This report provides the background information for the Public parks and land for community facilities Network, to support the development of the Goondiwindi Regional Council Local Government Infrastructure Plan (LGIP).

2.0 Service catchments

Goondiwindi Regional Council area is a large land area with a small population, and is oblong in shape. The local recreation park service catchments are Goondiwindi (aligning with the PIA boundary) and the balance of the region. The population shares the parks and community facilities assets, based on the activity being undertaken. Therefore, the service catchments for regional recreation parks, district recreation, district sports and community facilities land are region-wide. Refer to the plans for trunk infrastructure for the service catchment maps.

3.0 Demand assumptions and conversions

The demand for this network is population based, with a rate of land per 1000 people outlined as the target. The demand for each service catchment is outlined in Table 1.

The base year for the planning of the network is 2016 and the planning horizon is 15 years to 2031 to aligning with the ABS Census years. The base year for the costing of the network is also 2016.

The public parks and land for community facilities network is well serviced with land (Table 2). Some embellishments will need to be upgraded over the planning horizon to meet the increased demand.
